We will gather at the last remaining operational church, Yandoit Uniting, to hear memory keepers share stories of Franklinford Uniting church, the Catholic, Lutheran, Anglican and Uniting churches in Yandoit and (hopefully) the ex-Methodist church in Clydesdale. Yandoit Public Park and Recreation Reserve news

An application has been made to the Department of Primary Industry and Environment (DEPI) for Funds to replace the old toilets at the Reserve.

Recently a letter from DEPI advised of funds for maintenance and repairs for public reserves on DEPI land.

As the Yandoit Public Park and Recreation Reserve toilets were established in 1982, and the cisterns had finally irretrievably broken down it seemed like a perfect opportunity to put the case.

We won't know if the application has been successful for a week or two.

The next potential problem is the water supply to the toilets, which has failed sometimes in the past.

The water system is not only for the toilets but is also source for the school for emergencies and supplies a stand 'pipe near the hall.

The supply comes from a dam also on the reserve by way of syphon.

A 5000 gallon tank has been placed uphill of the toilets which is an emergency supply for the whole system if needed.

Also in the application for the toilet renewal is a for money for a solar pump as the emergency supply if the syphon fails.

If the application is successful then how the solar pump can fit in the system will be question put to the community, so put your thinking caps on!

The material to be burned off is that pile of stuff that accumulates near the tennis courts.

Obviously only burnable material should be placed on the pile.
