

FIRE SEASON & INDIGENOUS FIRE MANAGEMENT – A BOOK REVIEW Prepared

Fire Country: How Indigenous Fire Management Could Help Save Australia by Victor Steffensen shares the wisdom and practions (the word used by the elders to describe cultural knowledge and practices that are inseparable from and harmonious with nature), of Indigenous fire management as it has been passed down through generations and to him by Kuku-Thaypan elders Tommy George (the last speaker of Awu-Laya language), and his brother George Musgrave. Fire Country describes how fire is put on differing ecosystems at the correct time of year to produce the cool fires intended for burning grasses, and is contained by the surrounding ecosystems that are either too green to burn, or already burnt. While Aboriginal peoples used fire in order to maintain the health and diversity of ecosystems, Indigenous fire practices may be of particular interest to communities, such as ours, for protecting against the destructive summer wildfires becoming commonplace. Steffensen's business offers fire management workshops and services for building community fire management plans that may be worth perusing (see www.mulong.com.au). While the fine art of fire management appears to suit healthy ecologies, what to do when the landscape is full of Gorse, Broom, or that salt brush all over Steeles road? Healing country, says Steffensen, requires us to know "what the country should look like and what plants and animals are meant to be living there." Perhaps a good first step towards a community fire management action plan?

SEED LIBRARIES

Fifty years ago those growing their own food could choose from over 5,000 varieties of vegetable seeds and herbs around the world. Most of those seeds were held by small peasant farmers and First peoples. Then circa 1972, when Plant Variety Rights Legislation granted large seed

breeding businesses the right to patent seeds, the number of varieties available to the public decreased markedly. As a result, a much narrower range of varieties make up the vast majority of vegetables grown commercially. My favourite organisation is La Via Campesina which represents 182 organisations in 81 countries and represents 200,000,000 peasant farmer members, including me."This great organisation calls on governments around the world that will be meeting for the eighth formal session of the Treaty's governing body, to build with farmers and civil society an equitable mechanism for the renewal, conservation and access to seeds that are essential not only to our current food, but also to the food of our children and grandchildren. Those who refuse will have to account for it to the younger generations who are rising up all over the world against the irresponsibility of many leaders and the suicidal greed of the financial markets." 2018. On 18 December 2018, these efforts finally bore fruit, and the United Nations General Assembly adopted the UN Declaration on the Rights of Peasants and Other People Working in Rural Areas (UNDROP) . So for the moment we are reasonably safe. Seeds are the single most important part of our food production and during this COVID 19 period has concentrated peoples' minds, leading to thoughts about food security. Every resident uses seeds every single day of their lives. Grains for breakfast, vegetable soups for lunch and different vegetables, herbs and fruit in some form for dinner. So a Seed Library is not only a universally useful activity but also one which is uniquely essential to our basic wellbeing. Castlemaine Seed Library will be four years old in October 2020. During that time it has distributed, through Castlemaine Library, over 5,000 packets of vegetable and herb seeds to over 1000 borrowers. Feedback from borrowers has shown that many people who have never grown vegetables before have been inspired to do so through the work of the Castlemaine Seed Library. There are about 400 seed libraries in the US. Australia has only a few. So we are currently working on a Kit to help others set up a seed library. The people of Yandoit, Clydesdale and Franklinford may wish to set up their own local Seed Library. Castlemaine Seed Library would really appreciate any spare heirloom seeds that residents might like to donate.

Note: Daylesford also has a seed library currently housed at Hepburn Wholefoods Collective.
